University and College Land for Carbon - Grants and Funding Support

A list of funding and grants for institutions to support the delivery of woodland creation as well as planning and design planning to support the Woodland Carbon Code registration. For additional support contact your <u>regional woodland officer</u>.

Grant	Description		Eligibility	How to apply
Woodland Creation Planning Grant (WCPG)	Provides funding to help cover the costs of producing a UK Forestry Standard (UKFS) compliant woodland creation design plan. WCPG is for planning only and does not provide approval to plant. The total amount of funding is capped at £30,000 per project. Stage 1 you can apply for £1,000 and Stage 2, you can get £150 per hectare (minus the £1,000 from stage 1).	2)	Located in England A minimum of five hectares or more in total size. If the proposed woodland is split into different blocks, each block must meet the definition of woodland set out by the National Forest Inventory: a minimum area of 0.5 hectares and a minimum width of 20 meters Need a letter confirming that the landowner(s) support the application	 Stage 1: You can apply for £1,000 to complete the <u>Woodland Creation Design Plan Template</u>. This is a desk-based exercise to identify the constraints and opportunities that may affect the proposed planting. Stage 2: You can get £150 per hectare, minus the £1,000 offered at stage 1, to complete stage 2 of the Woodland Creation Design Plan Template. You may get supplementary payments for specialist survey work if a need for them is identified at stage 1. Step 4: Once your agreement is approved, you can claim your payment after you have completed the work.



Urban Tree Challenge Fund	The funding provides standard costs for planting large trees and their establishment costs for three years following planting. As well as the cost of buying and planting, the cost of basic protection and labour require to plant it. There are establishment payments to support the cost of weeding, watering, and checking trees during a 3-year period. This is for anyone who wants to plant trees in urban or peri-urban areas.	1)	Not currently within an existing grant agreement that has more than five months left Have full management or signed consent over the land for the duration of the agreement. Applicants will need to register with Rural Payment to obtain a Single Business Identifier (SBI) and a Customer Reference Number (CRN) Land must fall within an urban area, with a population of at least 2,000 people and a buffer of 1km to account for peri-urban planting.	Step 5: The first five years of annual maintenance payment will be paid automatically. Years six to ten will need to be claimed again for payments. The Urban Tree Challenge Fund is open for application but will take three to five months from submitting a valid and complete application to an agreement being offered. For 2024-2025 planting, applications need to be submitted by 30 th June 2024. To apply, applicants will need to register with <u>Rural</u> <u>Payments</u> to obtain a Single Business Identifier (SBI). *Requirements are up-to-date as of January 2024.
