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### **How Green is your University's IT?**

It's a 6 million-dollar question. In fact, it's probably worth more.

Did you know that the average university spends 50-60% of its multi-million pound power budget on IT? **Simon Tindall** and **Richard Barrington** of Sun Microsystems believe that a sustainable alternative exists, where faster can be cooler, better can be cleaner and cheaper can be greener ...

**Imagine** if every student had their own stove attached to their desk for cooking meals? For some budding Jamie Olivers, this may be a perfect solution ... a bacon sandwich for brunch or ricotta fritters at lunchtime!

But think about all that duplication, space, noise, heat – and those hefty power bills? Isn't a canteen a more realistic proposition?

While the original scenario is a little strange this is exactly how most universities deploy computing today with massive duplication of under-utilised resources. By moving towards a shared service approach such as the canteen, they could save up to 75% of their desktop/server costs and achieve a host of environmental benefits.

Rather than equipping every desk with a personal computer – that needs updating, managing, supporting, maintaining and replacing with alarming frequency – a growing number of universities are switching to simpler 'virtual display' technology that is little more than a screen with a card reader ... BUT backed by the power of the network.

The average PC consumes two tonnes of raw materials in manufacture, burns IRO 100 watts in use and lasts 2-3 years before replacement. 'Thin clients' are much more cost effective, last 15-20 years and consume a fraction of the energy, the latest generation IRO 4 watts, leading to enormous long-term savings and environmental benefits.

What's more, they take up less space and have no fans, significantly improving the working environment and reducing noise pollution associated with technology.

For users, the desktop experience is unchanged. They can still access exactly the same applications and other software, and as it's a service on the network, from any location on campus and beyond instantly and seamlessly.

Some extra processing power is needed in the data centre. But the resources are shared efficiently between users leading to further environmental savings.

A new generation of high-performance low-carbon servers are now on the market that will enable the replacement of many legacy systems. Often ratios of 10:1 are achieved which coupled with software technologies such as containers and virtualisation will further accelerate the environmental savings.

Establishments such as the Danish Technical University have already saved 75% of their desktop/server costs, while some of the UK university early adopters of this technology are rolling out new software on 'thin client' displays they purchased in the 1990s.

The 'thin client' approach is also eco-friendly and competitive ... and it's growing in popularity at a critical time.

Increasingly, universities will need to prove their green credentials to be compliant and attract applications from eco-aware students. The recent UCAS Future Leaders survey (www.futureleaderssurvey.org.uk) found that 76% of those applying for places believed that 'lifestyles need to change radically' for human civilisation to survive the next century. And many of these students will spend their money with universities they regard as 'greener'.

Low-carbon transport schemes are an excellent idea, sustainable building materials make sense and organic canteen food is to be welcomed ... but how green is your IT?

### A Sustainable Conference

The EAUC 11th Annual Conference will bring together delegates from every area of campus life, from the further and higher education sector. Delegates include those responsible for environmental management, estates and facilities, finance and procurement as well as curriculum leaders and students. The Conference will include plenary sessions, interactive workshops, Green Gown Awards Ceremony, Conference Dinner, Exhibition as well as the infamous speed networking. EAUC make conscious efforts to reduce our environmental impact of our Annual Conference by the following:

- EAUC are offsetting carbon emissions from the activities related to the Annual Conference directly to the venue. This includes the whole event (including pre-event and conference dinner), travel (speakers and delegates) and accommodation as well as the venue use. This will be channelled back to the host venue to ensure the local area benefits as well as the venue. An article explaining how the host venue has utilised this fund will appear in Earth, our quarterly newsletter.
- All conference correspondence to delegates, exhibitors, sponsors and speakers has been sent via email and available on our website to minimise waste.
- Delegate Bags are made from jute, making them reusable and biodegradable. The bags have been purchased through Canby Ltd who have a strong ethical trading policy – more details can be seen at www.canby.co.uk.
- Information in Delegate Bags and the Conference Programme are printed double sided, recycled paper and will be provided at registration.
- Delegate Bag enclosures have been prevented to minimise waste and we encourage delegates to use the Bring & Share desk to distribute their materials.
- Pens and paper will not be provided to delegates to encourage the use of reusing paper and pens.
   Delegates have been encouraged to bring notepads made from scrap paper.
- All EAUC marketing materials are printed on 100% recycled paper.
- Recycling points will be available around the venue and we ask delegates to ensure that they return their badges and any unwanted materials so we can reuse and recycle these items.
- Exhibitors have been encouraged to use recycled paper for their marketing purposes.
- Queen's Campus Conference Centre has excellent public transport links as well as an easy walking distance from the Train Station and we encouraged delegates to use this.
- EAUC encouraged all delegates, speakers and exhibitors who must travel by car to use the EAUC Car Share scheme. Details can be found at www.eauc.org.uk.
- A bus service will be provided from the venue to the Conference Dinner.
- All catering will be served using non-disposable crockery and cutlery.
- Fairtrade refreshments will be served, including tea and coffee and Fairtrade wine at the Speed Networking Event and the Conference Dinner.
- Organic and locally sourced food will be served where possible.
- The conference venue is self-contained to minimise the need to travel during the event.

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


