## Campus Sustainability Workshop Sessions

## A. UN Decade on Education for Sustainable Development

Facilitated by John Salter, Sustainable Development Consultant to Scotland's Colleges/SFEU; David Beards, Scottish Funding Council & Una Bartley, Higher Education Academy Curriculum Project Coordinator

This session will provide the opportunity to hear a brief outline of the aims of the UN Decade as they relate to FHE and what institutions are doing to take forward the UN Decade in Scotland. Discussions on how staff can engage and take the agenda forward at institutional and sector level. Summaries on work in progress with the SFEU ESD Curriculum Project and the HEA ESD Project.

**B.** Implementing a Climate Change Programme for Scottish Colleges & Universities Facilitated by Dave Gorman, Chair of Scotland's Principals' Climate Commitment Advisory Board; Alan Speedie, SPCC acting secretariat & Alastair Keir, Managing Director and Paul Smyth, FHE Liaison, Salix Finance

As well as reviewing the strategy of Scottish Principals' Climate Change Commitment and how senior management will be engaged, Salix Finance will outline plans for disbursing £1.2m being provided to Scotland's colleges from the Scottish Government for energy efficient capital projects. Both strategic direction – in the light of the forthcoming Climate Change Bill for Scotland – and the practicalities of bidding for energy efficiency project funding will be covered.

C. Achieving High Performance Estates – The New Guidance Facilitated by Courtney Peyton and Colin Brown, Thirdwave

This will provide participants with the opportunity to discuss how to incorporate the SFC Sustainable Development Guidance the new Guidance on High Performance Buildings into their Estates Strategies and maintenance practices.

**D. Environmental Legislation affecting Colleges and Universities**Facilitated by Alan Parnell, NetRegs & Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA)

An overview of the range of regulations affecting universities and colleges. Use of NetRegs and the ways in which this can provide useful guidance. Additional features of the NetRegs website. Are there gaps? What specific guidance is still required?

E. Embedding Sustainability into Procurement Practices Facilitated by John Forster, CaSPr Consultant

Participants will hear about development of the new procurement manual for Scotland's Colleges and Universities and have the opportunity to discuss the significance being given to social, ethical and environmental issues.
