Purpose of the Meeting

This is an initial evidence gathering meeting where we have invited some key stakeholders relating to this priority topic. We will be asking the expert witnesses to respond to the key questions as outlined below. We will then open the discussion to the wider audience for input. The aim is to provide guidance to the Climate Commission that we are asking the right questions and focussing on the correct areas that are needed. The recording and notes from the meeting will be publicly available.

This is the early stages for the Climate Commission and output, advice and support for the sector will emerge at a later stage based on the analysis of the evidence from this meeting and other inputs. Following this event further meetings and discussions will be held to help the Climate Commission develop the practical guidance and outputs for the sector for each priority.

Background Briefing:

What is the need?

If climate change has already passed the point of no return then deeper adaptation might be needed. We need to recognise and discuss how bad it could get and build mechanisms for this. We need to explore climate anxiety and develop safety measures for staff and students.

Key questions:

- What responsibility should universities and colleges have in introducing concepts of deep adaptation to their students?
- How best might they do this and what support might be needed?
- How do we build resilience within students, both physical and psychological?

Suggested solutions:

- Toolkit for Universities and Colleges on Deep Adaptation, including an "off-the-rack" discussion outline on how bad it could get and the need for deep adaptation and how institutions can respond. This

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should include outlines to enable discussions amongst groups of students, staff, senior management teams and board of governors. This could include outlines for an hour-long discussion, half-day or full-day session. There could also be some challenging reflective questions to consider.

Jem Bendell is a Professor of Sustainability Leadership and Founder of the Institute for Leadership and Sustainability (www.iflas.info) at the University of Cumbria in the UK, which co-delivers a sustainability-themed MBA programme with over 2000 students online from around 100 countries, with the Department of BLPSS and the Robert Kennedy College.

Jem provides strategy, leadership and communications support for chief executives in business, politics and civil society. Previously with the United Nations, he has since served on the boards of international investment funds and small charities.

In 2012, the World Economic Forum appointed him a Young Global Leader for his work on sustainability.

With over 20 years of experience in promoting innovative action for sustainable development, Professor Bendell has written over 100 publications on related topics, including five books. In 2013 Jem was dubbed "Professor Bitcoin" in the media for his explanation of the importance of digital currency when the University of Cumbria became the world's first public university to accept it for payment of fees.

He is a regular commentator on current affairs through his articles in national newspapers and websites.
